Wound Care

- If wounds develop from xylazine use, try to avoid injecting in or near the wound.
- Keeps wounds clean, covered, and change bandages daily or when soiled.
- Wash wound with soap/water or saline thoroughly after removing bandages.
- Apply a layer of Vaseline before rebandaging the wound.
- Store wound care materials in a clean and dry location.

Seek medical attention <u>immediately</u> if:

- You develop a fever
- Wound gets bigger
- Wound drastically changes color (yellow/green/black)
- Wound is not healing after several days

Xylazine is not safe or approved for human use.



Nearly <u>half</u> of all heroin / fentanyl in NJ contains xylazine.¹



How to Manage An Opioid/Xylazine Overdose If the person is NOT breathing, stay calm and...

Try and wake the person (tap, shout, rub sternum).



- **2** Call 9-1-1.
- Take naloxone out of package. Administer one dose.



- Start rescue breaths. Start with two breaths, then one breath every 5 seconds. Use a face shield, if you have one.
- If person is still not breathing after 2-3 minutes, administer a second dose.
- **Rescue Breaths**

If person starts breathing, reposition to rescue position.



Managing an overdose can be very traumatic.

Make sure to take care of yourself.

Risks of Xylazine Use

- Confusion
- Heavy sedation
- Dry mouth
- Drowsiness
- · Reduced heart rate
- Difficult breathing
- Coordination difficulties
- Coma

Xylazine use has also been associated with severe, painful wounds that worsen quickly.

How to Stay Safer



If you suspect an overdose, call 911



Carry naloxone (Narcan)



Tell someone you trust you are using



Take extra care if using alone
